Reno Aces Pride Night

This year, for safety concerns coming out of Covid-19 restrictions, the Aces went to no tickets in their traditional form. Fans will need to print a ticket out at home or have the ticket on their smartphone.

HOPES Give campaign all June

"We're inviting the community to play an instrumental role in connecting LGBTQ+ individuals to the support and care they deserve," said Todd Felts, EdD, HOPES Board Member. "Everyone can participate and give real hope by setting up an online fundraiser, donating, joining Give Out Day events and helping us spread the word."

Give Hope Day raises funding for health care organizations and service providers to the LGBTQ+ community during the month of June (Pride Month). Northern Nevada HOPES is hoping to raise \$25,000 during the 30 day campaign.

Funds will be used for LGBTQ+ health and wellness services including: primary care, HIV care and prevention, Hormone Replacement Therapy (HRT) and Gender Affirmation Surgery evaluations, support services like housing, medication assistance,

case management and more. Thanks to the generosity of Barry and Vivian Frank, each donation will be matched up to \$25,000. Every dollar raised will be doubled and have twice the impact.

Pulse Remembrance

Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd will be the site for this years, Pulse NightClub Remembrance on Saturday June 12 at 10 am.

The event is being sponsored by NICE, the Nevada Interfaith Coalition and Equality and Inclusion. The group of local religious leaders have sponsored the annual remembrance for the past four years.

The event is to remember the 49 victims of the mass-

acre that occurred on June 12, 2016 at the Orlando NightClub where people were just having fun.

The remembrance will feature a group of local LGBTQ+ leaders. There will be a tolling of the "G" chord, the sound of the beating heart. The bell is tolled after each name of a victim is read. A candle is lit after seven names are read to honor those lives lost six years ago.
